

"Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?"
John 6:1

As the multitudes descended upon Jesus, his first instinct was to offer hospitality--to feed them physically and to nourish them spiritually. The question above from John 6 verse 1 is asked of Philip by Jesus. John the Evangelist is quick to point out that Jesus asked this question to "test" Philip. And that may very well be the case--but I also do wonder if Jesus is slightly stumped and is struggling with how exactly to proceed.

This leads me to my own question: Can we make space in our lives where the fully divine and fully human Jesus is stumped and struggles (after all that is such a human trait--not at all sinful--and as such Jesus must have experienced such realities or he would be less than human rather than fully human).

As we awake from the more isolated measures of Covidtime, it isn't unusual for some of us to feel overwhelmed and to struggle with social interactions and groups. One person recently related that it feels like time itself was stolen from them--and that fitting back in, catching up, picking relationships back up is utterly exhausting even though it often comes with such joy. That comment reminded me of returning to school after a particularly difficult bout of chicken pox in fifth grade. When I returned my desk was quarantined to the back of the room--my classmates had moved on and I now had to figure out how to catch up and immerse myself back into the class. It took time. It required patience on everyone's part. It required work and real struggle. But I eventually got to where I needed to be.

Jesus and the disciples also got to where they needed to be. Whether it was a test and Jesus knew all along how it was going to work out or whether the divine and human nature worked hand and hand, in real time, to bring about the desired outcome; doesn't so much matter to me. The lesson is to persist, to show up with grace and allow the awesomeness of God to work through you and others...if we do this...all will be well.

Youth Engagement

The Youth Engagement Program provides religious education and service opportunities for our youth. Youth from Pre-K to high school are welcome throughout the year and new parishioners are invited to observe the classrooms and the curriculum.

Catechesis 1 (Pre-K and K)

This class uses the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, a Montessori-based program. The goal of this class is “To know and love Jesus”. Using parables, altar materials, and life experiences, the children who Jesus is and how we make the connections between Him and the church liturgy.

Catechesis II (Grades 1, 2)

Continuing the work from Catechesis, this class is working towards their Solemn Celebration of the Holy Communion in grade 2. Their instruction includes studying the books of the Bible, the Timeline of the History of the Kingdom of God, and the gestures of the liturgy service.

Older Youth

We are currently discerning the programs to be offered and would love your input! Traditionally, Grades 3, 4, and 5 and 6, 7, and 8 have had classroom instruction with older youth participating in Confirmation preparation.

Childcare

Many of our older students have volunteered for child care during the Sunday service which allows the parents of young children to attend the service knowing their children are engaged.


